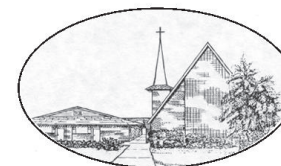

OUR GUATEMALAN HOST



Hugo Gomez, M.D., an evangelist and bilingual Guatemalan physician of 20 years in Quetzaltenango, Guatemala, will bring us "face to face" with the needs and opportunities of the people of Guatemala.

Centrally located in the heart of the Americas are the people of Guatemala...a people with many needs.

Thirty-five years of civil war devastated this nation of nearly 13 million people, and ten years of peace have seen little improvement.

In this predominantly rural and agricultural nation, 2 percent of the population owns 80 percent of the land. The inequitable distribution of wealth in Guatemala is the third worst in the world, and has kept the majority of the people in poverty.

While the population continues to grow rapidly, 75% of the people live in poverty. More than 40% of the work force is unemployed or underemployed.

Guatemala has the lowest schooling rate in Latin America, with nearly two and one half million children who do not attend school. 54 languages are spoken in Guatemala, but only 63% of the population is literate.



Guatemala has one of the highest infant mortality rates in this hemisphere... nearly 5 percent. Half of all children in the country are malnourished. In rural areas, Guatemalans may have to travel several hours to reach a medical facility, which is often understaffed and poorly equipped.

Yes, there is definitely a need for ministry to the people of Guatemala, and this is a time when the doors are wide open for the Gospel. Official separation of church and state has given missionaries great freedom. As a result, missionary assistance with social problems is turning the face of poverty into one of hope.

Would you consider spending time among the people of Guatemala? By doing so, you will be investing in the lives of those who are among the poorest of the poor ... the forgotten, the needy, the hurting. What's more, the people of Guatemala will leave you with a fresh perspective on life unlike anything you could experience at home.
